**Key Concepts**

**Advanced Academics:** Classes such as AP, IB, Cambridge, CTE, or Dual Enrollment where you earn weight in your GPA and have the potential to earn college credit. Search the college registrar's website for [transfer credit](#) standards.

**Certification or Credential:** A certificate is an official document that proves you've completed a course or achieved a particular skill. A credential is a broader term that refers to a qualification or achievement.

**Financial Aid:** Funds such as loans or grants that are provided to help pay tuition, fees, and other educational expenses.

**Grade Point Average (GPA):** Weighted GPA reflects the difficulty of the courses you take, giving extra points such as 5.0 representing A. Unweighted GPA, on the other hand, doesn't consider course difficulty and uses a simple 4.0 scale where an A equals 4.0.

**Division II schools** require college-bound student-athletes to meet academic standards for NCAA-approved core courses and **core-course GPA**. To be eligible to practice, compete and receive an athletics scholarship in your first full-time year at a Division II school, you must meet *all* of the following requirements:



1. Earn 16 NCAA-approved core-course credits in the following areas:
